Important information

Plot: Animal Farm depicts a group of animals who rebel against humans and become their own masters. Things work smoothly at first, and the animals revel in their freedom and have equality. However, the pigs become power-hungry and become the new oppressors of the animals and become indistinguishable from humans.

Themes: Leadership, corruption, control over the intellectually inferior, lies and deceit, foolishness. Violence. Pride. Future dreams and hopes.

Setting: Animal Farm, takes place on a farm in England during an undisclosed time. However, the time, location, and events of the novel are satirical of Russia during a major period of Russian political upheaval (1917 - 1945).
